- ✓ To provide ongoing active learning, all the specializations organize visits and industrial tours. This interaction with the industry results in student learning, through observation, various techniques/processes as well as assists in upgrading their knowledge.
- ✓ Internships in the industry organized by the college provide quality "hands on" experience. These interns are sometimes offered jobs by the company in which they have been interns.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

- ✓ The admission to first semester is given by college on the first come first served basis. The students from state board, central board or any other recognized board are eligible for the admission.
- ✓ First two semester of the B.Sc (Home) programme has common subjects.
- \checkmark The specialization in any particular subject is offered in 3rd semester.
- ✓ The principle subject is offered at the 3rd semester of S Y B.Sc (Home). A separate counselling of students is carried out and the subjects are offered on the basis of their merit of University Exam in First and Second Semester.
- ✓ Students with Diploma in Home Science are admitted at 3rd semester of S Y B.Sc (Home).





Student Feedback on Various Attributes of Teachers' (2016-17)

The students were asked to assess the teachers attributes on five point Likert type rating scale, namely clarity of subject, interest generated among the students, teacher's behavior with the students, knowledge base, regularity in taking up classes &practicals, evaluation method adopted by the teacher and teaching methods used during the teaching. The results revealed that 94 percent of the teachers were assessed by the students in various attributes to be good to very good except few teachers which falls in the category of average to good in attributes like interest generation and evaluation method. It is interesting to note that 18% of the teachers were rated excellent in their overall assessment by the students.



A very few teachers need improvement in their behaviour when dealing with the students and the teaching methods adopted by them, while selected few needs polishing on the aspects of knowledge base, evaluation method, regularity & evaluation method.
